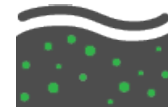

SUNLIGHT

Full sun; meaning it should get at least six hours of direct, unfiltered sunlight each day



SOIL

Grows in acidic, alkaline, loamy, moist, rich, sandy, well-drained, wet and clay soils



ATTRIBUTES

- Native to the Midwest and east central US
- It has bark that is grey-black and deeply furrowed
- The whole fruit, including the husk, falls in October; the seed is relatively small and very hard
- The tree tends to crop more heavily in alternate years after 12 - 15 years of growth
- The tree is self-fertile but requires wind for pollination (multiple trees recommended to ensure pollination)



POTENTIAL PROBLEMS

Can be toxic to certain trees and plants (chestnuts, pines, arborvitae, apples, cherries, tomatoes, potatoes, peas, peppers, cabbages, alfalfa, blueberries blackberries, azaleas, rhododendron, lilacs, hydrangeas, privets and plants in the heath family--if planted too close.
